The United States has always fashioned itself as a leader in the area of human rights, going so far as to give itself the right of "right to protect" sometimes abbreviated as "R2P" (suspiciously though, not through the mechanism of international law). But in last 50 years, that image has begun to wear thin, with many around the world seeing the US as acting unilaterally to expand its own power, and in the process disregarding the human rights laws and protocols set up after World War Two.
