

Instructions for the May 5, 2020 Lecture

Folks we have two more lectures to go. Almost there. You should have your research paper back by now, so go ahead and fix anything I marked that needed to be corrected. Tonight, I would like to expand on the discussion we had back on March 10th when we were looking at political culture theory by taking a deeper look at how religion and nationalism effect the international system and whether these phenomena work to expand or reduce conflict in IR. Lecture 14. Religion and Nationalism

Task 1: Read these instructions (just two more times).

Task 2: Read text "Religion: Why Faith is Becoming More and More Popular" by Harriet Sherwood. Many of my students think religion will be a force for continued problems in the world. What do you think?

Task 3: Watch the lecture presentation on "Religion and Nationalism." Two powerful forces in world politics. We'll look at positives and negatives.

Task 4: Read the article for your journal response "The Forever Wars" by Saad Hafiz. You can find the question on the link titled "Lecture / Discussion Page" highlighted in yellow. After completing the response, you will have until the date posted on the assignments page on Canvas to upload.

Task 5: Open the link for the video and watch *The Doctrine of Discovery: Stolen Lands, Strong Hearts*. A little known religious inspired doctrine still in effect today.

Task 6: Click the link titled "Discussion Board Question and Peer Responses for Video Presentation" and answer the question that I have posted in approximately one to two paragraphs or so. Wait for other students to put their responses and then pick two students to respond to. The deadline for these responses will be posted on the Canvas assignments page. Don't be late....
